


READY ALL, ROW!

CAUTION!

- Fall Fog
- Shorter Days
- Colder Temps
- Floating Debris
- Waterfowl Hunters

Rowing in late September and through-out October means dealing with fog, late sunrises and early sunsets, debris that's hard to see, increasingly cold air and water temperatures.

And if that's not enough to convince you that rowing season is winding down, Connecticut River goose and duck hunting seasons will open on October 5 and continue beyond the beginning of November, when the Kendal dock will be pulled out of the water. Yikes! Another reason to wear hi-viz clothing and stay alert.

Do not row in fog unless you can see the Vermont shore from the Kendal dock. If fog sets in while you are on the water, move slowly, be prepared to stop quickly, and use a coxbox, horn, or whistle to advise others of your location.

Club boats may not launch before sunrise and must return to the dock by sunset. **Private boat** owners who choose to row in the dark must use lights, and are strongly encouraged to wear bright or reflective clothing.

Note: Sunrise on September 15 was 6:23 am; sunset was 6:53 pm. Sunrise on October 15 will be 6:55 am; sunset will be 6:01 pm.
